### **Excursions and Activities Philosophy**



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## CAMBRIDGE MISSION STATEMENT







### **Second City Training Centre (Drama Workshop):**



### Legoland:


### **Skiing & Snowboarding:**


### Golf:

The aquarium aligns with the Ontario curriculum in the areas of science, biology, environmental science, and geography. Students can engage with interactive exhibits and learn about aquatic organisms, their biology and behavior, and their roles in aquatic ecosystems. The aquarium provides opportunities to explore environmental issues related to water conservation, pollution, and climate change. The trip can help students develop their scientific thinking, observational skills, and understanding of ecological systems.

### Other School Excursions (Cont'd):

### Casa Loma (Grades 1 to 6):

### **Power Plant-Harbourfront Art Gallery (Grades 1 to 8):**



### **Greenwood Conservation Area:**

### **Lynde Shores Conservation Area:**

This park in Whitby features trails for hiking, wildlife viewing, and birdwatching, as well as a boardwalk and picnic areas. It aligns with the Ontario curriculum in the areas of environmental science, biology, and geography, providing opportunities for students to learn about the natural environment, observe wildlife and ecosystems, and explore the physical and human geography of the region.

### **Rouge National Urban Park:**

As one of the largest urban parks in North America, this park in the GTA features trails for hiking, wildlife viewing, and picnicking, as well as historic sites and ecological restoration projects. It aligns with the Ontario curriculum in the areas of environmental science, geography, and history, providing opportunities for students to learn about the natural environment, observe wildlife and ecosystems, explore the physical and human geography of the region, and learn about the history of the area.

### **Newsletter:**


